Young people call for change



84%

of kids and teens want **financial education** to be made **compulsory on** the new **National Curriculum**



72% of kids and teens say they've learnt money skills from their parents - versus:

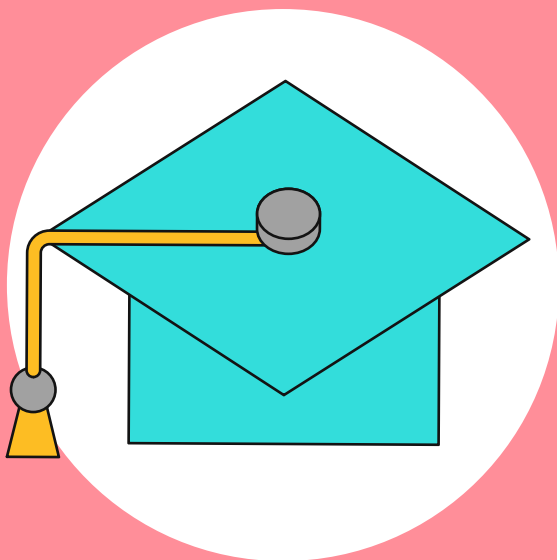
26% from social media
24% from school
21% from friends

The money topics kids most want to learn about in school are*:

- 46% How to save money
- 34% How to buy a house (e.g. mortgages)
- 34% How to earn money and build a career
- 31% How to create a budget
- 31% How to use a bank account



52% of 6-10 year olds would like to start learning about financial education from primary school



33%

of kids and teens believe financial education should be taught as part of PSHE

22%

believe it should be taught as a standalone subject

91%

of kids and teens **agree¹** that **financial education** is a **key skill** that will help them in adult life and work

84%

of young people say that **financial education** is equally or **more important** than **Maths, English, and Science^{2*}**

68%

of **18-year-olds** are **worried** about leaving school without any **money skills***

Only 1.5%

of kids and teens said they **wouldn't want to learn about financial education** in school
